INTRO TO BIRD WATCHING - WED 6 APRIL

We only had four persons, so we went in one car. I suspect that the early start may have influenced attendance decisions, but it was necessary because we were travelling to Bungendore and intended to make many stops.



Our first stop was at the farm dam on Lake Road, where we saw several species of ducks, **Black-fronted Dotterels** and other water birds. We saw the honeyeater migration in full swing, with several flocks of up to 30 flying overhead in a south-easterly direction.

We made more stops along Lake Road. Highlights were large flocks of **Crimson Rosellas**, which had segregated themselves into either adults or juveniles, and a pair of **Scarlet Robins**.

Our next stop was the Bungendore Common, where we had our morning tea and walked around the ponds. It was overcast and starting to get a little cool, so we headed for home, stopping at the dam on Trucking Yard Lane. This venue is renowned for species of duck which are not often seen elsewhere in this region. Unfortunately, the beautiful Plumed Whistling Ducks were not there. The rain held off until we got back into the car and we managed to get back to Tuggeranong before it became too heavy.

TALKING TRADITION!

EASTER TRADITIONS IN BERMUDA

Good Friday in Bermuda

For most Bermudians and residents, Good Friday is a time for tradition. They build and fly their Bermuda kites, make codfish, and English style hot cross buns and spend time with family and friends.

Fun kite fact: Flying kites originated in Indonesia 3,000 years ago. Much later, it reached Bermuda when British Army troops used them to plan telegraph poles!

Originally, kites were not flown until after 3 pm in Bermuda, however these days if you can get your kite up, it stays up all day and only comes down if it rains. Bermuda kites have long cloth tails and are in different colours of paper tissue, wood, and string. Some are huge, in exquisite patterns and require several men to get them airborne. Some are deliberately made to emit a humming or buzzing sound, with a hummer made from glued paper. Another variation of the Bermuda kite is the traditional Somerset brown paper kite. It is made of brown paper, cross sticks with a hummer behind the head stick.

Bermudians take their kites very seriously and the sky is transformed into a dancing mosaic of brilliant and beautiful shapes, colours, and sounds.

No one is certain how this long-established Bermuda tradition started, but one story often repeated is that it began with a Sunday school teacher's creative lesson on Jesus Christ's ascension to heaven. It is said that the teacher made a cross kite, took it to a hilltop, and set it flying, then cut the string and the students watched it sail upward towards heaven.

However the tradition started, kite flying on Good Friday is now an avidly awaited ritual in Bermuda.

Bermuda Codfish Cakes

While these by themselves are not uniquely Bermudian, their development as a uniquely Bermudian dish, is worthy of special note. The dish was once only found seasonally but nowadays, Bermuda codfish cakes are not just a tradition on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, but an island inspired dish found on local menus all year round. When made with care from imported salted codfish and given special local treatment, the dish is absolutely delicious!

Bermuda Easter Lilies

Many Bermudians and others associate Easter lilies with Bermuda, and at one time the unique Bermuda variety was world famous.

It is not generally known that the Easter Lilly did not come to Bermuda until the 1870s, by accident instead of design. A ship, with a supply of bulbs, limped into Bermuda for emergency repairs and in the process, the bulbs arrived here too.

The Bermuda grown variety usually open around Easter, but it is not uncommon for many to bloom before Easter. Some plants have a flower, which lasts about 10 days, while some stems may have as many as six separate flowers.

A local tradition is that a finest selection is always sent each year to
Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II
in time for the Good Friday
celebrations.

TALKING TASTY!

THE BEST COD FISH CAKES ARE MADE IN BERMUDA

Bermudians ALL love cod fish cakes and now you have the chance to see what all the

fuss is about and make your own! The delicious patties are served all year round with peas and rice or between a bun, with mayo, tomato sauce or homemade tartare sauce.

However, the most popular time of year for cod fish cakes is Good Friday when they are usually eaten with freshly made hot cross buns. Not sure about that combination!



Ingredients

2 Large potatoes cubed 2 pack of skinless boneless saltfish (250g)

2 tbsp butter 1 small onion finely chopped

2 tsp Fresh thyme ½ cup fresh parsley

½ tsp cumin 1 tsp curry powder (or to taste)

½ tsp paprika 1 tsp onion powder

1 tsp all-purpose seasoning 1 tsp Pepper

1 egg

½ cup all-purpose flour 2 tsp Seasoning salt

Preparing the Fishcake Mixture

Boil salt fish, until soft. Allow to cool completely then if needed pick away any bones or skin.

Peel and cut potatoes into cubes then boil until soft. Drain and mash well.

Cook the onions and fresh thyme in butter in a small pan until onions have become translucent. Remove from the heat and allow to cool.

Combine all the cooled cooked items into one large bowl and add the seasonings. Taste to see if it is to your liking, then add the egg and mix well. Place the mixture into a sealed container and refrigerate for 1 hour or overnight.

Cooking the Fishcakes

Once your fish cake mix has set, form into patties, and roll them into the seasoned flour.

Heat a large pan on medium high and fry in shallow oil until both sides are golden brown.

Remove fishcakes from hot oil and place on paper towel or a draining rack.

Serve between a bun or with peas and rice.




SYMBOL ADDITIONS SOLUTION
