Library tours


Whether this is your first visit to the Library, or the next of many, you can learn more about the Library, our services and our exhibitions by joining one of our free information sessions or guided tours.

TALKING TRIVIA - OLYMPIC RINGS!



The next Olympic Games are just over a year away, but did you know that the iconic symbol of the Games, the Olympic Rings for the 2000 Sydney Games were made in Goulburn?

The Goulburn company, Kermac Welding and Engineering, put together the gigantic steel structure. The 78m by 38m ring symbol weighted approx. 40 tonnes and hung from the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

They were the centrepiece of the Games: mounted on the east-facing arch of the Bridge and radiant with thousands of lightbulbs, the gigantic Olympic rings illuminated the Sydney skyline for the duration of the Games.





Following the Games, the rings were returned to Goulburn and the Australian Olympic Committee agreed that the people of Goulburn could put up the rings as long as there was no commercial gain, in accordance with the Olympic Insignia Protection Act – OIPA. Kermac's Managing Director Don Earle wanted the rings to be displayed somewhere in Goulburn or elsewhere but neither government nor anyone else was willing to put up the money to re-display them.

Ten years later, in Sept 2010, just days before the 10th anniversary of the Games, Earle voiced his desire to get the rings out of his factory yard. They were lying in pieces, rusting on the ground and open to the elements. He was reluctant to have them melted down due to their iconic nature.

Not able to scrap them, Earle put them in his factory shed where they were found by local businessman Bernard Maas who purchased the property in early 2015. Mass contacted the Australian Olympic Committee about the rings, but they did not respond. Needing the space, he auctioned the iconic symbols on eBay and in May 2015 they were sold for \$21,000 to a Newcastle electrician.







The massive structures were still in perfect condition and needed several trucks to move them.

On the 20th anniversary of Sydney 2000 games in Oct 2020, the rings appeared again on eBay, this time with a \$100,000 price tag. However, they do not appear to have been sold and are believed to be stored at a property at Tin Can Bay, near Noosa after they failed to sell.




