It keeps friends in touch over a pub trivia evening, and in a locked-down world in 2020 and 2021 it maintained vital social connections through quiz events on Zoom. Trivia can provide an outlet for people who struggle to find their place in life, and gives them something of which they can be proud. And if that's not enough value, it can also lead to cold, hard cash".

# UNCOVERING THE MYSTERY OF SOME POSTCARDS, A BLACKSMITH, AND THE BOWNING PUB

It was sitting on the counter at the Belconnen Vinnies – an old photograph album, so beautiful, thought Gabrielle Affleck, that it should be in a museum. She bought it for \$50, took it home, and started to leaf through its pages.

It was to be the start of a magical mystery tour that Gabrielle now hopes will have a happy ending when the treasure is reunited with descendants of its original owner, whoever they might be. She has uncovered an album of approx. 80 postcards, seemingly the life, times, and work of one Alf Saunders (or Sanders), believed to be a blacksmith.

Through the postcards, writing and other details, he can be connected to the British Army, Clovelly (NSW) and North Devon in the United Kingdom with postmarks on the cards ranging from 1908 to 1911.

After looking through the album, and all the history it contains, Gabrielle felt it was important to try to return it to his family and is keen to find out if any ancestors of Alf Saunders/Sanders, circa 1910, are still around today.







She has started to check the Yass connection, as the only Australian postage stamp and postmark uncovered is Yass. The postcard is addressed to Mr A Sanders at the Bowning Hotel, but the date is obscured. She knows he wasn't the publican, as there's no evidence of that, but thinks he might have been a guest.

Interestingly, the postcard came from someone called Jamie in Yass. Some of the later postcards refer to his wife, Jamie, so perhaps this is where they met, but those other cards were sent to him at an address in the UK. There's another Jamie connection in later correspondence with his sisters, who ask about her.

People used postcards to communicate all the time which is why Gabrielle feels this album is so important; rarely is real life recorded so objectively like it is through this sort of correspondence.

If you can help shed some light on Alf Saunders/Sanders, his family, time in Yass, anything that can help Gabrielle return the album to its rightful owners, email shopman@region.com.au and they will pass on the information to her.

#### TALKING TRADITION - CORONATION CHICKEN!

#### THE ORIGINAL CORONATION CHICKEN

A British Royal Dish

The original Coronation chicken was invented by writer Constance Spry and the founder of the famous Le Cordon Bleu cookery school Rosemary Hume, while preparing the food for the banquet of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953. 'Poulet Reine Elizabeth', is believed to have been inspired by the 'Jubilee Chicken' created for George V's Silver Jubilee in 1935.



The original dish is basically cooked chicken meat with a simple curried mayonnaise dressing, and uses curry powder, because fresh curry spices were almost impossible to find in post-war Britain.

# CURRIES: DISHES FLAVOURED WITH CURRY

Cream of curry sauce

1 tablespoon oil

2 oz. onion, finely chopped

1 dessertspoon curry-powder

I good teaspoon tomato purée

1 wineglass red wine

wineglass water a bay-leaf

salt, sugar, a touch of pepper

a slice or two of lemon and a squeeze of lemon juice, possibly more

1-2 tablespoons apricot purée

‡ pint mayonnaise

2-3 tablespoons lightly whipped

a little extra whipped cream

Heat the oil, add onion, cook gently 3-4 minutes, add curry-powder. Cook again 1-2 minutes. Add purée, wine, water, and bay-leaf. Bring to boil, add salt, sugar to taste, pepper, and the lemon and lemon juice. Simmer with the pan uncovered 5-10 minutes. Strain and cool. Add by degrees to the mayonnaise with the apricot purée to taste. Adjust seasoning, adding a little more lemon juice if necessary. Finish with the whipped cream. Take a small amount of sauce (enough to coat the chicken) and mix with a little extra cream and seasoning. This is an admirable sauce to serve with iced lobster.

The original coronation chicken sauce recipe was reproduced in The Constance Spry Cookery Book in 1956

Serve the coronation chicken with a salad, rice or as a filling for jacket potatoes and sandwiches.

Note: For a lighter version, substitute the whipped cream for crème fraîche or Greek yogurt.
