



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
Variations on a Star - Part I

- This is a two part project that is fun and creative. Although it is a structured series, no finished drawing will ever look like another one! I have attached some images I made, so you have an idea where this finishes.
- You will need — some paper
a pencil
an eraser
a fine point marker/felt pen.

- Before you start — practice drawing stars. They should not be too small. Mine are about the size of a 10¢ coin.




- Using your black fine liner, draw a square on your paper. Mine is 9 x 9 cms.
- Using your pencil, draw 4 or 5 stars, randomly spaced.
- Starting with your first star, and using your pencil, draw one line extending out from each point and each valley.
- Using your black fine liner, draw around the out-line of the star.





- ② The next step is to draw a parallel star around your original star.
 • Using your pencil, and starting about 2mm from your star point - along the point line. ① Keeping the same distance all the time, draw from that point, down to the valley line ②, and back up to the next point line. ③




Continue all the way around your star.



You will have a parallel star, using the point and valley lines as guides.


- Now repeat this pattern, so that you make 2 parallel star shapes around your original star.



If the stars you drew in the square are well spaced, you may be able to fit a third layer of parallel lines on a couple of your stars.




- ③ With your fine liner/black pen, draw over the layers of parallel lines around the star. Draw in the point and valley lines too, but don't extend them too far beyond the star shape, as we have to be able to knit them all together in the next part. Next step - rub off all the pencil work.

- ④ Now you have your basic pattern. It's time to start adding blocks of black colour.



① Start with a space adjacent to the star

② Working around the star, leave the next space white
 ③ black
 ④ white


- Work the next layer of parallel sections of the star pattern in the same way, alternating blocks of black and white.



(3 layer star)

- Now have fun with the other stars in the square. Draw 2 layers around each one, and if you have room, draw 3 layers on one or two of them.
